From the President

We would not normally bring you an ACOFS Bulletin in November but as we have some breaking news about DVD rights from Madman, and as many societies are now deciding on their 2012 program, we thought we should bring you this information now.

The two main DVD distributors supporting the ACOFS "DVD rights agreement" have been Roadshow and Madman. Imagine our concern when we discovered Madman were considering making their DVD rights available only through an agent and at an increased fee. Many societies are quite small, so the increased price would have caused them to avoid Madman DVDs or blow their budget. As expanded in the article below, that situation has thankfully been avoided and Madman DVD rights will continue to be available at the regular fee of \$55, but now through ACOFS. This is important as the Madman catalogue contains many titles of interest and importance to many film societies. Thank you John Turner for bringing this about and thank you Paul Tonta of Madman for agreeing to John's proposals. Thank you Susan Davidson for taking on the extra task of booking and invoicing.

Madman DVD rights now available through ACOFS

It recently came to our notice that Madman were no longer taking bookings from Film Societies for DVD rights for their DVD screenings.

The bookings were to be re-directed to another distributor where the fee was set at \$88.00, a 60% increase over the usual rate of \$55.00 under the ACOFS agreement.

John Turner from the ACOFS executive has now come to an agreement with Madman that ACOFS will be permitted to approve the screening rights for non-theatrical screenings of Madman DVDs by affiliated Film Societies at \$55.00 per screening. This fee is for screening rights only where you supply the DVD.

Susan Davidson (ACOFS) will be the person looking after your bookings for all Madman DVDs at dvdrights@acofs.org.au or 03 9874 5270. The screening date must accompany any booking. Invoices will be sent out at the time of screening and are to be paid promptly to ACOFS. ACOFS will reimburse Madman, in full, every three months.

The Madman for-sale catalogue is on their website www.madman.com.au. But be aware that their latest acquisitions may not yet be on their website, and as Madman distribute some titles for other companies they may not hold the rights for all titles on their website. Susan Davidson however, will have the latest list of Madman titles which can be approved for screening.

Below is a list of 50 or so titles of interest to film societies taken from the 15 pages of Madman titles available. A short review of some of these will be provided in the next Bulletin.

DVDs In the NTLC Funded by ACOFS

In the last financial year the acquisition of 9 DVDs in the NTLC (Non-Theatrical Lending Collection at the National Film and Sound Archives) were funded by ACOFS and 11 by WAFFS (WA Federation of Film Societies).


To help the NTLC expand its collection in a direction appropriate to film society interests, ACOFS and WAFFS donated \$5,000 between them towards the purchase of specified titles, together with non-theatrical rights, for the collection.

BOFA Film Festival 2011 Program

The MyState BOFA Film Festival has announced its 2011 program of over 40 international and Australian features and documentaries that reflect the festival's fresh approach to filmmaking and contemporary issues with films that inspire positive change.

MyState Financial has partnered with BOFA to conduct the first major annual film festival to be held in Tasmania, running over 5 days (23 - 27 November) in Launceston's Tamar Valley.

This year the films selected will either incorporate themes about "New Horizons" (such as new technology, social and third world issues) or "Food for Thought" (films exploring and celebrating food and food technology and the treatment of animals).

Opening the festival is Norwegian comedy Happy Happy. A story about characters behaving badly and the winner of this year's Sundance Film Festival Grand Jury Prize for Narrative Feature.

Festival visitors can also look forward to a

preview of one of the biggest television events for 2012 with Producer John Edwards (best known for his series *Love My Way, The Secret Life of Us, Offspring*) talking about his shows and revealing excerpts of mining tragedy *Beaconsfield*, which is scheduled to screen in 2012, for the first time.

Australian premieres include such features as *Jeffie Was Here* and the documentary *Burning in the Sun*.
