#### 1. From the President

I am constantly reminded that in dealing with film society committees, we are dealing with enthusiastic amateurs! There may be a few experts among them, but in the main they are amateurs, and thankfully, mostly enthusiastic!

Organisationally, the committees may be amateurs also. Most committees meet regularly although that might be only once or twice a year! The FVFS annual membership application form for example, asks many questions, many of which can reveal a limited understanding of the society committees. For example, one question revealed that one committee member thought their "parent organisation" was the FVFS. Another suggested Consumer Affairs!

ACOFS and the State Federations have focussed on providing information to support DVD rights, taxation, incorporation, technology and getting insurance, etc. But I have spoken to society committee members who have no idea they have to obtain screening rights, who don't care about the image ratio or size, screen their DVDs from a laptop, and who are

happy with mono sound from a crappy old speaker. This is another area where I feel they need a little "education".

So what should ACOFS and the Federations be doing to help committees run their film societies? Apart from the obvious, like making sure that a wide range of films and DVDs are available at reasonable cost, I think it comes down to education - communication AND education.

To this end, I believe the most important things that ACOFS and the Federations should be doing include up-to-date websites, regular newsletters, regular information days, and supporting communication between film societies. The annual re-affiliation of societies with the Federations should be more than just collecting money and giving a receipt. It is an opportunity to ask leading questions which can reveal how well the society is performing and whether additional "education" is needed.

Turning now to a recent development in the world of social media which perhaps carries a message for us all. You have probably read that Facebook is in strife over leaking personal data from many millions of users. How safe is the membership data you hold? While you are obliged to retain some membership data, it is your duty to ensure that data is not stolen or publicly available to be used for other purposes. How many societies (or Federations) have even considered this? And how secure is it against accidental loss?

So in summary, the main purpose of ACOFS and the State Federations is to ensure we are set up to provide information and support to and between our member societies. How do we rate?

And if you represent a film society, your main purpose is to bring to your members their choice of quality films in a comfortable cinematic environment, regardless of the medium, that ensures the screenings are social events and promote interaction between the members and with the local community. How do you rate?

## 3. Competition Winners

During April, ACOFS conducted a competition for a number of free double passes at a number of venues in every State, to pre-season screenings of the about-to-be released CHAPPAQUIDDICK. Tickets were allocated to the first members to log in to "Shorfilmfirst".

CHAPPAQUIDDICK is a piercing re-examination of the true events surrounding the most difficult seven days of Senator Ted Kennedy's career when he drove off a bridge, ending the life of his passenger Mary Jo Kopechne, a promising political strategist who had worked on his brother Bobby Kennedy's presidential campaign the year prior.

It starts on the eve of the moon landing, July 18, 1969, at a party in a rented house on Chappaquiddick Island, celebrating a reunion of many Bobby Kennedy campaign workers. With his brother John's presidential legacy looming large as his promise to land a man on

the moon is coming true, Kennedy leaves the party early giving Kopechne a fateful ride to the ferry. He approaches a narrow bridge at angle with the dirt road and in an instant the car flips over into the murky waters below. Kennedy escapes but the 28-year-old campaign worker remains trapped inside. In the aftermath, Kennedy fails to report the accident for nine hours. The Senator struggles to follow his own moral compass and simultaneously protect his family's legacy, all while simply trying to keep his own political ambitions alive.

Directed by John Curran (Tracks, The Painted Veil) from a screenplay by Taylor Allen and Andrew Logan, CHAPPAQUIDDICK features a strong ensemble cast, including Jason Clarke (Ted Kennedy), Kate Mara (Mary Jo Kopechne), Ed Helms, Jim Gaffigan, Clancy Brown, and Taylor Nichols with Olivia Thirlby and Bruce Dern.



#### 6. New Titles from the NTLC at the NFSA

The NTLC (Non-Theatrical Lending Collection) is part of the NFSA (National Film and Sound Archive) in Canberra. There are 1,682 DVD and BluRay titles, of which 851 are feature films available for loan to film societies at \$22 (including rights and delivery to you). See their catalogue at <a href="loans.nfsa.gov.au">loans.nfsa.gov.au</a>

The following licenced DVD titles are listed as having been added in the last 90 days: Herbert, 2015 Karla, 2065 (BluRay)

Also don't forget that the NTLC may have some older titles which you will not be able to get elsewhere. Even where the original Australian distributor no longer holds current rights, the NTLC may have purchased the screening rights themselves.



A new arrangement at the NTLC is that they may be able to licence a viewing of your own copy of a DVD where they hold the screening rights to that title in their collection. This means that if a title held by the NTLC is already booked out when you want it, you can use your own copy after paying the NTLC the normal \$22 fee for the screening rights for that title

#### 8. ACOFS AGM

The 2018 ACOFS AGM and discussion day was on Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> April, at The Willis Room, Whitehorse Civic Centre, Nunawading. Several delegates who arrived early, joined us for a meal on Friday, and several stayed on afterwards for a dinner and movie on Saturday night.

Important issues covered include:

- Reports were presented from all State Federations. Most are healthy with numbers of member film societies on the increase.
- Privacy and security of members' data is very important, brought to a head by lapses in Facebook security. We have a legal obligation to keep all customer data secure.
- There are a great number of on-line and computer-based packages available to small clubs, many of which can be useful to film societies. These include Wix (Website creation and hosting), mailchimp (email assistant) Member Ties (Membership database), TryBooking (on-line ticket sales), Stripe (On-line payments. See your Federation secretary for more information.
- The distribution of film societies across Australia are as per the table:

- The DVD rights agreement is worth up to \$70,000 per year to the distributors, and covers the rights for over 1,100 DVD screenings Australia-wide.
