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1. From the President - Mark Horner.

Thank goodness for film! Living in Tasmania I enjoy nothing more than slipping into a cinema seat to watch a film, especially in winter. Enjoying a good film and escaping from the weather. Perfect. Of course, I need to deal with braving the elements and getting to the cinema, but once there, I am rewarded with my efforts and happily take a seat.

Recently, my film society, The Launceston Film Society, hosted our voting nights for our term two film screenings. Members who attend our Monday, Wednesday and Thursday film screenings are invited to attend a voting function after the film and share a glass of wine and a nibble while chatting and engaging in registering their votes for the films they liked the most or liked the least for the term. The functions usually generate a lot of positive discussion about the films we screen and how we choose what will be screened.

The process The Launceston Film Society uses to choose films that members may appreciate and enjoy is not all that complicated. Our committee of eight are sent a list of films and asked to select the films from that list, without consultation. It does take a little time to read reviews and watch trailers to choose the ten films you would like from the list of seventy films. The responses are collated and it is amazing how many films receive a vote of eight or seven with the selection process usually sorted with films that scored six, five or four. The fact that eight people choose the program for 1600 members who frequently give positive feedback on the selections is quite extraordinary and very satisfying.



Film societies rely on the support and resources of volunteers who share their time and talents without any compensation. Successfully screening films for members to appreciate and enjoy doesn't just happen, it takes time and effort from volunteers who engage, contribute and get involved. The efforts and actions of all volunteers are very much appreciated and I am sure all film societies have volunteers that simply stand out.

Don't forget, ACOFS would very much like to hear from you if you would like to be part of a sub-committee to explore and examine future film screening mediums and formats. There have been several responses so far and hopefully by November 2019 the sub-committee will be established.

4. New Titles from the NTLC at the NFSA

The NTLC (Non-Theatrical Lending Collection) is part of the NFSA (National Film and Sound Archive) in Canberra. There are 1,682 DVD and BluRay titles, of which 851 are feature films available for loan to film societies at \$22 (including rights and delivery to you). See their catalogue at loans.nfsa.gov.au

The following licenced DVD or BluRay titles are listed as having been added in the last 90 days:

Also don't forget that the NTLC may have some older titles which you will not be able to get elsewhere. Even where the original Australian distributor no longer holds current rights, the NTLC may have purchased the screening rights themselves.

The NTLC may be able to licence a viewing of your own copy of a DVD where they hold the screening rights to that title in their collection. This means that if a title held by the NTLC is already booked out when you want it, you can use your own copy after paying the NTLC the normal \$22 fee for the screening rights for that title.

Unfortunately, titles which come up as "Educational Use Only" cannot be screened at a normal film society – except where that film society is a member of a U3A group.
