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1. From the Editor - Ian Davidson editor@acofs.org.au

Members of many societies have asked "What will replace DVDs, and is our existing equipment going to be obsolete soon?" Has anyone got a crystal ball?

For some time now BluRay discs have been offered as superior technology to DVDs, but in my opinion, the advantage has not been great - especially when a DVD can be played on equipment that "upscales" the resolution to near BluRay quality. It is not 100%, but pretty good for most applications.

Some popular movies are now available on 4K discs (Ultra high definition - UHD) and this is probably the next obvious upgrade path for most film societies - as long as the cost is not prohibitive and the sought-

after movies are available in 4K. Streaming services are growing rapidly, but I don't believe this will impact film societies in the long run. Most of the available streamed content seems to be especially made for

streaming - mostly drama seasons rather than normal length movies. And film societies offer so much more social interaction than is possible with home-streamed movies.

So my prediction, for what it is worth, is that DVDs will continue to be available for some time to come, but if a film society wishes to upgrade their sound and vision quality they could benefit from investing in a 4K player and projector, with a 5 or 7 channel Dolby sound system. But no need to rush. 4K is relatively new, and there is not a lot of



equipment to choose from. 4K discs (Which will probably be marketed as 4K BluRay discs) are available, but not common. At this stage it is not clear to me whether Regional coding will apply to 4K discs and players – a factor which could impact any benefits of early adoption.

2. Member film societies

Most film societies are fully operational again after COVID restrictions have been lifted, and some are even back to their full pre-COVID strength. As film societies tended not to promote themselves over the last two years, they have suffered from two years of normal attrition, (about 20% per year) without any new members, so it is no surprise that most are reporting a 30-40% reduction in members compared with pre-COVID numbers.

State Federations have reported that only a few societies have not recovered from COVID and will not be renewing their activities. But that has been countered by some new societies that are ready to start up in 2022.

3. Reports From State Federations FVFS – Victoria

The FVFS AGM was held on 26th March, and was our first face-to-face meeting of any sort in two years. It was attended by 20 people, of whom 17 were delegates from 12 member groups (from our current 82 groups).

Not surprisingly, much time was spent discussing the impact of COVID, and how societies are recovering after the restrictions were eased. Most reported a loss of members over the two years of restrictions, when few screenings were held and no new members were sought. Almost all waived membership fees over these two years.

Highlights of the day were the screening of the films made by the two Deakin University students who won the FVFS "Film Society Award" of \$1,500 each, and the screening of the feature film "King of Peking" followed by a Q&A session with the director, Sam Voutas, and producer, Melanie Anslie. This film is in the FVFS "Indie Library".

4. News From the DVD Distributors

These titles have been provided by the respective distributors as being either new acquisitions or titles of interest to film societies. Only distributors who have provided information are included here, but all distributor contacts are still listed in ACOFS Information Sheet 3B.
